## **Safeguarding**

### **Tackling Child Abuse (HM Government/DfE)**

The government has launched a campaign called 'Together we can tackle child abuse'. The resources, aimed at everyone in the community, include four very short videos explaining physical abuse, emotional abuse, sexual abuse, neglect and online abuse.

The simple mnemonic, ABC, is used to remind people that they should look out for changes in appearance, behaviour or communication. The webpage has a search engine to find out where to report abuse.

We all have a role to play in protecting children and young people from child abuse and neglect.

Many people do not act because they're worried about being wrong.

You don't have to be absolutely certain; if you're concerned a child is being abused or their safety is at risk, speak to someone. Following these simple steps and reporting your concerns to your local council, could provide the missing piece of information that is needed to keep a child safe.



To spot the [signs of child abuse or neglect](#) look out for changes in these characteristics.

- **Appearance:** such as unusual injuries or consistently poor hygiene.
- **Behaviour:** such as being withdrawn, overly anxious, disruptive or self-harming or any other sudden changes in behaviour.
- **Communication:** such as talking aggressively, using sexual language or becoming secretive.



You have a number of options when it comes to reporting abuse anonymously. You can talk to:

- Listening to your concerns.
- Gathering information.
- Assessing the whole picture.
